

I know everyone of my patients that put forth a good effort has been justly rewarded. Each day when they wake up and take a look in the mirror they realize they too have a winning smile!

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

As I have contemplated the fragility of life from our own recent family experience, I have also reflected on my personal life history after leaving Cuba at nine years of age, back in 1962, to come into exile in the United States. My family, like so many others, has lost many of our relatives back in Cuba, as well as here in the U.S. After 48 years of exile, I cannot forget the pain we have endured as our older generations have died without seeing Cuba be free again. Many in exile had the illusion of returning to their beloved island after the end of communism.

Back in the summer of 1989, I visited Germany for the first time. It was very emotional to feel the tension firsthand between the East and the West. Several months later that year, I regret not having gotten on an airplane and flown back to experience in person the fall of the Berlin wall and East Germany. While in Miami, many expected Cuba's communist dictatorship to also fall soon after the demise of the Soviet Union. I had no such expectation since Cuba is an island and had different dynamics, namely one evil dictator, Fidel Castro, who studied Hitler, Stalin, Mao,

other oppressors and implemented in Cuba improved tyrannical strategies to doom the Cuban population.

Eventually communist Cuba survived the downfall of the USSR by becoming more closely allied with communist China and using its model. Economy and political ruthlessness with no space for dissidence and responding with brutal mortal force are standard operating procedures and have been evident for the last twenty years. Those who hope that a positive democratic change would be coming with Fidel's illness and convalescence, and the transfer of dictatorial power to his brother Raul should look at what China has done to shatter any expectation of what an open embargo would accomplish with real democratic changes.

As new reports of Fidel Castro's illness and expectation of his eventual death have run rampant over the last three years, I have decided I can no longer wait for another of our Cuban or Cuban-American loved ones, whether old or young, to pass away while the leader of Cuba's failed communist revolution, who has brought nothing but destruction to the Cuban nation and its people, lingers on. So, I have decided not to wait any longer, but to officially declare him dead and bury the tyrant. There may be more of him, since many believe that he has been cloned, but, for me, he is dead an no more. As the pastor of the parish of the Church of the Little Flower, Rev. Arthur Dennison, so eloquently stated in a recent sermon, "If there is no justice in this world, then just wait for eternal justice at the Last Judgment." Let's do the "monster mash," sing and dance on!

Thanks to the wisdom and foresight of my maternal grandfather, Francisco (Panchito) Pereira, the seven members of our family who fled the island have been living in the "Land of the Free", a country full of countless opportunities. Abuelo Panchito, as he was affectionately known, gathered his family together one evening and told them "I do not want my grandchildren to grow up under communism, so, you must leave Cuba now". This was a difficult and painful decision which continues to split the family's remaining living relatives to this very day. Our family takes great pride and honor in their sacrifice for the wellbeing of the children at the time.

I have dedicated this issue of Star Smiles News to all the victims of the Cuban communist regime in its many forms.


Pooh Bear and Politics



Our dear friends Dr. Andrés and Rosie Cendán, to whom the last issue of Star Smiles News was dedicated, recommended Lolita to us for our daughter Carolina's piano classes. Lolita taught their children Andy and Arlene, as well as many of their other friends' children. They all loved and respected this grand lady.

Arlene Cendán says "To this day I remember her passion for playing and wanting us to succeed in the instrument" and, in the words of Andy Cendán, "Lolita was very instrumental, and a very big part in my life. I remember how patient she was with me, which you all know, that when I was younger, I was CANDELA! For whatever reasons she put me in place and I Respected her Tremendously. I just knew that it was time to stop clowning around and get the notes right. Playing the piano helped me concentrate and focus better. One of the things that I would like to do later in life, if all goes well, is Play The Piano Again!!".

When Liza and I met her, we were struck by her class and demeanor. We were elated that not only our daughter would learn to play the piano but, in the process, she would receive an awesome general education in everything

from attitude, commitment, discipline, character, taste, philosophy, ideology, Castilian grammar and pronunciation.

Seedlings is one of a number of recent works where I address issues related to the dark side of human nature. This piece, where men are being created, hints at their potential as destructive forces as they are to be disseminated throughout the world.

Todd Behrens, curator of the Polk Museum of Art, writes of this body of works as "connected to the idea that humankind itself has built into the structures of our societies and cultures the means of its own demise...."

William Cordova

Born 1971 in Lima, Peru; lives in Houston, Texas, Miami, Florida, and New York. New York

William Cordova's work is tied to an urban ecology of obsolescence, disparity, and displacement. Busted cars, trashed tires, discarded shoes, machetes, speakers, and books yellowed with age provide the material support and iconographic program for his drawings, collages, and installations. For the artist, these material choices reference the reality of lived experience, as opposed to the spectacle of culture, mass-produced for constant consumption. The fluency with which Cordova traverses media and remixes cultural signifiers confirms his visual multilinguism, as barbed as it is lived-in.

The range of Cordova's sources is strikingly evident in the titles of works like Medgar Evers (2005), daniel boone, pat boone & mary boone (y los Olmec's?) (2006), and Arrow of god (4-chinua achebe) (2006). His rapaciousness shows as well in his frequent use of color symbols, as in the red and black in O. T. atsinadnas (2007), at once referring to the colors of the Sandinista flag, a politically charged image for some viewers, and existing purely as formal composition. As an extension of his individual artistic practice, Cordova has collaborated with fellow artist/writer Leslie Hewitt through their BASE collective on projects such as I Wish It Were True (for more information about this project, please see Hewitt's artist entry in this catalogue). Another project, From the Root (2006–), utilizes existing billboards to activate dialogue within their respective communities


by listing names of activists in an anti-chronological and -hierarchical fashion.

Cordova has been preoccupied with issues of transformation and interpretation since his youth, owing partly to his own transitions between countries, economies, and languages. Having recently moved from Lima to Miami, the six-year-old found comfort in the sight of what he thought were familiar Peruvian cajón drums scattered on the streets, but which were in fact discarded speaker boxes. The hulking Badussy (or Machu Picchu after dark) (2004-05) dominates the gallery with some two hundred old speakers stacked to suggest a pre-Columbian monolith. Similarly addressing the fragility of history through an ephemeral environment, The House that Frank Lloyd Wright built 4 Fred Hampton and Mark Clark (2006), shown at Arndt & Partner Berlin in 2006, is a dizzying room-scale labyrinth of wooden beams based on the footprint of the house where Black Panthers Fred Hampton and Mark Clark were killed by Chicago police in a predawn raid in 1969. Much of Cordova's work induces similarly uncanny interpretive spirals, abetted not by arbitrary Surrealist juxtapositions but the all-too-common strangeness of our own detritus and the too-often repressed histories they conceal.

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
